



## Pupil Premium Statement: 2015 – 2016

### Background to the Pupil Premium

The Pupil Premium is a government grant which is allocated to schools based on the number of pupils on roll who are either: looked after children, children of service personnel, children registered for free school meals or children who have been registered for free school meals within the last 6 years. The grant was introduced in 2011 and the amount allocated per student in 2015-16 is £1320. The purpose of the grant is to support schools in ensuring that children who may be disadvantaged achieve and attain in line with their peers.

### Our Rationale

Fairway School acknowledges the responsibility for 'socially disadvantaged' pupils and we are committed to meeting their pastoral, social and academic needs within our school. We are committed to 'narrowing the gap' between vulnerable pupils and the Pupil Premium funding forms a vital part of that process.

Our approach the Pupil Premium through the following principles:

- Ensuring that teaching and learning opportunities meet the needs of all pupils;
- Ensuring that appropriate provision is made for pupils who belong to vulnerable groups, including ensuring the needs of socially disadvantaged are adequately assessed and addressed;
- Recognising that not all pupils who receive free school meals will be socially disadvantaged, as well as that not all pupils who are socially disadvantaged are registered or qualify for free school meals;
- Allocating the funding to support any pupil or groups of pupils the school has legitimately identified as being socially disadvantaged;
- Allocating the funding following a 'needs analysis' to identify priority class, groups or individuals.

Provision is made through:

- Enabling pupils' access to education;
- Enabling pupils' access to the curriculum;
- Alternative support and intervention within the school environment.

The targeted and strategic use of Pupil Premium funding will support us in achieving our vision of accelerating progress and moving children to at least age-related expectations in English and Mathematics.

# Academic Year 2014 - 15

In 2014/15 Fairway Primary School received **£111,132** for pupil premium.

The budget was divided into the following areas:

## **Accelerating Progress**

1. Reducing the size of teaching groups to ensure pupils receive high quality, differentiated and targeted support in Y5 and 6
2. Providing continual CPD to further develop staff skill sets and to ensure teaching and learning are impacting effectively for pupils
3. Facilitating pupils access to high quality resources to enhance independent learning e.g. SAM learning and Mathematics
4. Additional TA support to support vulnerable pupils e.g. Y1 class

## **Enriching the Curriculum**

1. Ensuring all pupils have an opportunity to enhance their learning through educational visits and outside opportunities regardless of their economic background e.g funding for school trips, school journey and swimming
2. Providing opportunities for specialist teaching e.g. Y6 Arts Project

## **Extended School Support**

1. Developing opportunities for pupils to access the school's provision both before and after school e.g. school's after school provision, subsidy for after school clubs e.g. through funding TA to run a club once a week

The budget will be divided into the following areas:

## **Accelerating Progress**

1. Reducing the size of teaching groups to ensure pupils receive high quality, differentiated and targeted support across the school;
2. Providing continual CPD to further develop staff skill sets and to ensure teaching and learning are impacting effectively for pupils;
3. The introduction of Read Write Ins phonics to ensure that every child makes accelerated progress for reading;
4. Facilitating pupils access to high quality resources to enhance independent learning e.g. SAM learning and 1:1 phonics tutoring;
5. Additional TA support to support vulnerable pupils e.g. Y2 & 4 classes.

## **Enriching the Curriculum**

1. Ensuring all pupils have an opportunity to enhance their learning through educational visits and outside opportunities regardless of their economic background e.g funding for school trips and school journeys;
2. Funding for children across the school to access swimming lessons.

## **Extended School Support**

1. Developing opportunities for pupils to access the school's provision both before and after school e.g. school's after school provision, subsidy for after school clubs e.g. through funding TA to run a club once a week;
2. Funding for school counsellor for vulnerable children.

The average progress in reading is -1.3 which is expected to be below the national average of 0  
 The average progress in writing is -0.3 which is expected to be below the national average of 0  
 The average progress in maths is 0.6 which is expected to be above the national average of 0
